## **Opening Leads**

## Active Vs Passive

When the opponents have bid strongly to game (1H - 2C - 2NT - 4H) they obviously have most of the big guns. An aggressive lead is called for. You are trying to find partner with a specific card to take the contract down. If the opponents have limped into game (1H - 2H - 3H - 4H), then the points are more evenly distributed then there is no hurry to get your tricks let declarer find the missing cards and make the mistakes; so make a passive lead.

## **Worst Leads**

## In order of horror

- 1. Lead away from A
  - only exception is when you have all four aces
  - This is the worst lead not only because you are setting up declarers KQ but also you are lying to your partner.
  - Choose ANOTHER suit
- 2. Leading an unsupported Ace.
  - Sets up cards for declarer even if partner has bid the suit is no guarantee that he has the K.
  - Choose ANOTHER suit. If partner has overcalled a suit and you don't lead that suit, he knows you have the A in that suit
  - There are a couple of exceptions; a) if you are in a suit slam lead the ace to put declarer under pressure he has to take all the other tricks and b) if you know that you 9+ cards in the suit then it is OK to lead the ace as you may not get it otherwise.
- 3. Leading away from tenace.
  - AQX or KJxx
  - If you lead suit you give declarer the missing card as a trick if he leads the suit or partners leads the suit you take his honour.
- 4. Leading top of partners suit.
  - This will tell partner very little and he will not know if you have a doubleton and can get a rough. And worse it may promote a trick or two for declarer. eg

- If you lead the K then Declarer will make his Q and discard a loser in dummy thereby giving him two tricks he did not deserve
- If you lead a small one promising an honour partner will know you have either K or Q in either case he should still return the J. If declarer has the K he will make the one trick that he was always going to get.
